**Annual Report
of the Seventh Day Baptist
Council on History**

for the year 2023-2024

So Joshua called together the twelve men he had appointed from the Israelites, one from each tribe, and said to them, “Go over before the ark of the Lord your God into the middle of the Jordan. Each of you is to take up a stone on his shoulder, according to the number of the tribes of the Israelites, to serve as a sign among you. ...And Joshua set up at Gilgal the twelve stones they had taken out of the Jordan. He said to the Israelites, “In the future when your descendants ask their fathers, ‘What do these stones mean?’ tell them, “Israel crossed the Jordan on dry ground. For the Lord your God dried up the Jordan before you until you had crossed over. ...He did this so that all the peoples of the earth might know that the hand of the Lord is powerful and so that you might always fear the Lord your God.” “ Joshua 4: 4-6a, 20-23a, 24 (NIV)

God directs His people to remember. The testimony of His faithfulness in the past compels those in the present to be faithful to God, because He always keeps His promise “Never will I leave you; never will I forsake you.” (Deuteronomy 31:6; Hebrews 13:5) Today we can view the Newport Church, preserved as part of the Newport Historical Society, as a type of “river rock” witness, pointing to the faithfulness of God in establishing Seventh Day Baptists in North America. The stories contained in the volumes of material at the Seventh Day Baptist Historical Library and Archives serve as signs for the physical and spiritual descendants of those who lived those stories. Ask the question: “What do these 'stones' mean?” and search out the answers to tell your children and those in your congregation. This past year's effort of the Council on History to record God's faithfulness and tell His story among our people is given below.

Library Services

Reference Assistance: Cassie Stanley, researcher to whom we lent Palestinian clothing of SDB missionary Rev. William Mead Jones (her ancestor), again contacted us for scans of the letters of Charles Saunders who led the agricultural component of the mission to Palestine. Director Kersten also provided her contact information to the Hebrew University in Jerusalem.

The request of the Ephrata Cloister in Ephrata PA for additional tracts, Seventh Day Baptists and Seventh-day Adventists Compared, was fulfilled. The Maxson Family Association visited the Library as did genealogist Randy Beebe and others. Pictures were sent to the American Baptist Quarterly to illustrate an article about SDB pastor Rev. Darwin Maxson, written by

Wayne Maxson. The Drake House Museum in Plainfield NJ requested burial records of the historic SDB church cemetery there, also known as Cedar Brook Cemetery.

Milton House Museum: As a historic site in Milton WI built by SDB town founder Joseph Goodrich, the Museum continues to seek collaboration with SDBs and a good relationship is enjoyed. Often SDB groups meeting in Janesville tour the Milton House. Director Kersten is giving assistance to the Museum in producing an educational curriculum for Milton schools that they hope to distribute statewide. He also lectured at a spring 2024 museum event, explaining the history of SDBs and how the beliefs of Milton's founders impacted the community, and that those roots continue their impact to the present day.

In addition to the listed items, we served as the archive for official conference documents and reports, and had other donations beyond those listed here as well. Should it be desired, we will gladly receive church records to secure them, even as they are still available to the church if needed.

Website: Our revamped website, www.sdbhistory.org, soft launched in the fall of 2023, although some adjustments continue. Please remember that all access is free! We hope many are taking advantage of the resources readily available to answer questions, research ideas, and learn SDB history. A store for purchases is in progress.

Genealogical Assistance: The library and archives does not offer genealogical services but volunteer Gay McRoberts answers requests on a time-available basis. Seventeen people received assistance this year. Researchers may contact Gay at www.genhelp@seventhdaybaptist.org.

Binding: The regular binding work to collate SDB Yearbooks, containing General Conference business, program minutes, and the SDB Directory, resumed this year. A delay in binding some years is due to needed refinement of the collected data, but that work is progressing.

Projects

ArchivEra: Two years ago, the Council hired a company to convert over 220,000 index entries from portable document format (PDF) to comma separated value (CSV). This was the first step in the project to load the periodical indices of the Sabbath Recorder and previous SDB periodicals into the online catalog/index, ArchivEra. Volunteers continue to correct errors and standardize index entries in the CSV files. (It is easier to perform this clean-up before the records are loaded into ArchivEra.) The volunteers have completed about 75% of the data cleaning tasks. The next step will be to work with the ArchivEra team to transfer the 220,000+ records into ArchivEra for easy access by all researchers.

The Rev. Darwin E. Maxson project to debind, scan and preserve 26 volumes of this 19th century SDB pastor's sermons, manuscripts, and notes continues. The material is being carefully digitized for ease of use by researchers and the originals archivally preserved.

Seventh Day Baptists in Europe and America (SDBEA), Volume 4: This project to tell the SDB story from 1950 to 2000 is still in its beginning stages. Dr. Elizabeth Camenga Lawton, Timothy Lawton, James Skaggs, and Director Kersten are the committee leading the effort.

Biography Committee: This committee of the Council encourages churches and families to submit death notices and obituaries for their loved ones to biography@seventhdaybaptist.org. This email address may also be used if one has questions about what information to submit. Please assist us by answering follow-up questions we may have to give full honor to the deceased. Sabbath Recorder editor Pat Cruzan, Director Kersten, and committee members Donna Bond and Judy Parrish receive submissions, which are kept at the library. Judy Parrish is updating biographical sketches of Conference pastors and leaders, continuing from those compiled in the 1972 book *Seventh Day Baptists in Europe and America (SDBEA)*, volume 3. Obituaries written by Donna Bond for Conference leaders who died during this Conference year are appended to this report.

We are also exploring endeavors in website preservation and photo restoration and regeneration, using skills offered to us by individual SDBs.

Communication and Publishing

Sabbath Recorder: One historical article was published in the reporting year. Written by Doug Welch, president of the Milton College Preservation Society, it was titled "Pratt and Platts, Freedman and Freeman" describing SDB pastor Lewis Alexander Platts and former slave and Underground Railroad traveler Andrew Pratt.

Video Report: This year's conference video report of current and expected future Council activity is available through Conference links.

Social media: A plan is in place but regular posts by our media chairperson, Madge Chroniger Kuhn, have not yet commenced.

Council Operations and Support

Zoom meetings are held with all Council members bi-monthly. We are grateful to the Conference for providing that capability.

Donations: The Council gratefully receives monetary support in any amount. However those wishing to be called a Friend of the Council may give an annual gift of \$25; a gift of \$250 names one a lifetime Patron of the Council, and a \$5000 one-time or cumulative gift designates a Legacy Partner. To contribute to the work of the SDB Historical Library & Archives, donors are encouraged to select "Giving" in the SDB Conference website (www.seventhdaybaptist.org). In the "Fund" drop-down box on the next screen, select "Provide Fund Name or Ministry Intended to Support." In the "Note" box that opens, enter "SDB Historical Library" or "Centennial Fund."

Director of Education and History Rev. Nicholas Kersten taught the SDB University (SDBU) spring 2024 class on SDB History. He is now the Vice President from North America for the SDB World Federation and traveled to Malawi, Africa in September 2023 for its convocation. He has the additional duty of chairing its newly created Historical Preservation Committee, offering encouragement and assistance in a global effort for all member groups to collect, preserve, and promote their histories. When the Visiting Instructors Program (VIP) pastors from Africa came to Janesville in November 2023, Director Kersten relayed more information about SDB and General Conference history and polity and took them to nearby historical sites. Director Kersten is regularly called upon to speak to various SDB churches and associations and mentor the Emerging Leaders young adult group. Director Kersten also represented SDBs at the National Association of Evangelical's Legacy Tour in Montgomery AL, April 8-10, 2024.

Library Assistant Rinald Kersten's work included accessions, separation and labeling of the de-bound Rev. Maxson material in preparation for scanning and storage, reorganization of the library vault to provide space for SDB World Federation material, and adjustment of library shelves such that space for new additions is now available.

Auxiliaries: We appreciate Conference Virtual Assistant Brittany Kersten and Genealogist Gay McRoberts for their continued quality work on behalf of the Council. 2023 Summer Conference Intern Xavier Pethel and returning volunteer Ellie Greene contributed valuable assistance in scanning many pages of needed documents. Former SDB Historian Tom Merchant continues his volunteer service of preparing material to transfer to ArchivEra. We also greatly appreciate the contributions of Janet Thorngate in her role as a consultant. These volunteers are of great help to the Council's mission to "Remember our past to inform the present and envision the future."

The late 17th and 18th century westward movement of SDBs is reminiscent of the Israelite move into the promised land. Churches across the U.S. (e.g. Berlin and Verona NY, Shiloh NJ,

Salem WV, Milton WI, North Loup NE, Riverside CA, to name a few) were established as favorable land conditions supported en masse family and church moves, often after a select few went on scouting missions, again evocative of the Israelites and the promised land. By remembering, preserving, and telling our stories, we revere and bear witness to the power of our God who never changes and never fails His people, praised be His Name!

Deceased SDB Pastors and Conference Leaders from Conference 2023 through June 2024

DENNIS “DENNY” LYNN BOND 1956-2024

Dennis Lynn Bond was born in Clarksburg, WV, on September 12, 1956, to Walter Lee and Betty (Connolly) Bond. He graduated from South Harrison High School in 1974. In 1978 he earned a Bachelor’s degree in Business Management from Salem College.

His July 30, 1977, marriage to Melissa “Kim” Gaston was blessed with three daughters: Nichole Amber (Henry) Bender; Tiffany Lynn (Greg) Hoskins; and Brittany Lorena (Tristan) Jenkins.

Denny enjoyed a lifetime career in accounting with Dominion Transmission. Beginning in high school and continuing throughout life, he worked as a volunteer firefighter with Lost Creek and West Milford, WV, fire departments. After retiring, he raised cattle; mowed grass and did repair jobs for neighbors; and bred Shih Tzu puppies, which he and Kim delivered to adoptive homes.

Denny served the Lost Creek, WV, SDB Church as deacon and trustee. He was also a member of the Board of Directors for Camp Joy in Berea, WV. In this capacity, he led many young people to Christ while making improvements to the camp facility.

On February 1, 2024, Denny passed away at his home in Laurel Park, WV. He is survived by his wife and daughters, as well as eleven grandchildren and three siblings. Burial took place at Flora Hills Cemetery near Quiet Dell, WV.

SHARON “JILL” (McCOY) BURNS 1957-2016

Sharon Jill McCoy, daughter of Charles and Eileen (Pusey) McCoy, was born in Pocomoke City, MD, on November 19, 1957. She graduated from Pocomoke City High School in 1976.

On June 2, 1977, Jill married Rev. Michael L. Burns in Pocomoke City. Together they served the Hebron, PA, and Albion, WI, SDB Churches, with Jill teaching VBS at Hebron. Their children are: Katherine Patricia (Maurice) Jones; Desmond Burns; and Sara (Kurt) Rebiger.

Jill died at her home in Edgerton, WI, on June 30, 2016, and is survived by her husband and children. A memorial service was held on July 9, 2016, at Albion with interment in Maryland.

REV. OWEN FLOYD LYNCH, JR. 1969-2023

Owen Floyd Lynch, Jr. was born the eldest child of Owen F. Lynch, Sr. and Josette Lynch on May 20, 1969. Being raised in Birmingham, United Kingdom, where his father was a leading member and pastor of the Birmingham SDB church, Owen graduated from Joseph Chamberlain College in Birmingham in 1989.

Emigrating to Canada for education in 1993, Owen graduated from DeVry College of Technology in Toronto in 1997 with a degree in Computer Information Systems. After graduation, Owen began work with Verizon, where he worked for the remainder of his life. After moving to Canada, in 1993, Owen married Heather Condison. They have three children: Josiah, Jordan, and Jalyssa.

When he arrived in Toronto, Owen joined the First SDB Church of Toronto. Following a call to pastoral ministry, Owen enrolled at Tyndale Theological Seminary, earning his Master of Divinity from that institution in 2015. The First SDB Church of Toronto ordained him to pastoral ministry on February 18, 2017. He served the congregation until his death.

Owen died at Lakeridge Health, Oshawa, November 17, 2023; age 54 after a battle with cancer. He was buried at Thornton Cemetery in Oshawa.

THICE LYSTRA (COVER) MILLER 1923-2023

Thice Lystra was born to John Cover and Lillian Jackson in Wakefield, Trelawny, Jamaica, on June 23, 1923, and was raised by her maternal grandparents, Simeon and Rebecca Wynter. At age 12, she left school to support her grandparents. During the same year, she was baptized and joined the Wakefield Seventh Day Baptist Church.

At the age of 20, she met her husband, Stephen Miller, Sr., and married him in 1944. This marriage produced eight children: Earl, Alfred (d. 2020), Lystra (Blossom), Beverly, Joan, Dalhart (Hope), Stephen, Jr. (Ranny), and Myrtle (Beckie). She helped support the family while helping others in professional hospitality, seamstressing and crafting. Mrs. Miller was widowed in 1986.

After her husband's death, Mrs. Miller immigrated to the United States, where she became a citizen and settled in the Wakefield section of the Bronx with Dalhart and Myrtle. She joined the Faith Seventh Day Baptist Church of the Bronx in 1996 and was ordained as a deaconess. After her retirement, she raised grandchildren and maintained their home while their parents were at work and served neighbors as long as she was able.

Mrs. Miller passed away peacefully in her sleep on July 16, 2023 at her home at the age of 100.

SAMUEL STERLING 1952-2023

Samuel Sterling was born to Stanley and Sarah Sterling on August 23, 1952, in St. Catherine, Jamaica. He served as Deacon at the Waterford SDB Church in St. Catherine before emigrating to the United States in 1996.

He worked as an artificial inseminator in the veterinary field. In addition to starting several successful businesses, Samuel founded the Agape SDB Church in New York City, NY, and pastored it for twelve years. Wherever he went, he was a passionate minister of the Gospel, even after his retirement from the active pastorate.

Samuel, who resided in Leesburg, GA, died at Select Specialty Hospital in Tallahassee, FL, on July 21, 2023. He is survived by his wife Jacinta and daughters, Sheena (Jamaal) Sterling-Fyffe and Samantha Sterling. Burial was in the Leesburg Cemetery in Albany, Georgia.

REV. WILLIAM EUGENE "BILL" SHOBE, JR. 1954-2023

William Eugene Shobe, Jr., was born to William E. Shobe, Sr. and Nanette (Osbourne) Shobe on October 3, 1954, in Denver, CO. As a young man, he served as student pastor in the SDB Church there.

Bill married Shelley Hunt in 1978. Children born to them were Joshua A. (Beatriz) and Tamara (Jacob) Latchem, both of whom survive him. This marriage ended in divorce, as did a later marriage to Helen Martens.

He received his Bachelor's degree at the University of Colorado and, in 1981, his Master's of Divinity degree from Conservative Baptist Theological Seminary in Denver, specializing in Extension Ministry.

Bill was ordained at his first pastorate, Metro Atlanta, GA, in 1984, where he was a charter member. At that time he shared that he had been led to Christ at a Baptist church in France where, he stated, "I had to listen hard because the message was in French." Later that year, he was accredited at our Conference session.

While he pastored the Houston, TX, SDB Church, he was active in a national evangelism ministry called Time to Revive. His other pastorates included the Washington, DC, and Dodge Center, MN, SDB Churches.

Bill was active in the denomination in a variety of capacities. During the 80s and 90s, he was a staff member for Youth Pre Con and SCSC. He served a term on the Council on Ministry, and, at the time of his death, Christian Education Council. Wherever he went, he used his skills in carpentry, speaking and cooking. Perhaps most noteworthy was his talent

as a multilingual traveler, for he recently represented our denomination when he served as French translator in the Democratic Republic of Congo.

Rev. William Shobe, Jr., was called Home at the Mayo Clinic in Rochester, MN, on August 19, 2023.

WILLIAM “GARTH” WARNER 1926-2023

William “Garth” Warner, son of Stanley and Elmina (Camenga) Warner, was born on March 26, 1926, on the family farm in Durhamville, NY. He grew up on the farm and was drafted into the U. S. Army when World War II broke out.

In 1948 he married his childhood sweetheart, Mayola W. Williams, who predeceased him on June 28, 2021. The Warners’ children are: Mark (Norma), Kevin G. (Julie), James A. (Sharon) and Wendy Warner Park. In addition, they welcomed into their home a foreign exchange student from Japan, Toyama Fujii, who still thinks of them as her American parents.

In the early days of his marriage, Garth worked at washing windows and building houses, always dreaming of becoming a shop teacher.

At age 33, he started attending night classes at Utica College and eventually attained a Bachelor’s Degree in Education. His professional career began as a fourth grade teacher at Westmoreland Elementary School. He then was awarded a scholarship at the University of Rochester, where he attained a Master’s Degree and returned to Westmoreland Central Schools as a guidance counselor until he retired in 1993.

A lifelong member of the Verona, NY, SDB Church, Garth was ordained as Deacon in 1959. He also served as church chorister for a number of years. Garth was active in prison ministry and the local chapter of Gideons International and, with Mayola, directed The Power Company, a teen singing group.

On the denominational level, the Warners directed Youth Pre Con and cooked for Young Adult Pre Con. Garth also served as Conference Interest Committee Chairman and was on the Memorial Fund Board of Trustees for several years.

On August 19, 2023, Garth entered eternal rest from his earthly home in Oneida, NY. Services were held on August 24, 2023 at the church in Verona and burial was held in New Union Cemetery, Churchville, NY.
